

WARNING: THIS APPARATUS MUST BE EARTHED.

WARNING: To prevent damage which may result in fire or shock hazard, do not expose this appliance to rain or moisture.

This device is not intended for use in the direct field of view at visual display workplaces. To avoid incommoding reflexions at visual display workplaces this device must not be placed in the direct field of view.

The equipment is not intended for used at a video workstation in compliance BildscharbV.

The sound pressure level at the operator position is equal or less than 70 dB (A) according to ISO 7779.

WARNING:



This appliance is supplied with a moulded three pin mains plug for your safety and convenience. A 13 amp fuse is fitted in this plug. Should the fuse need to be replaced, please ensure that the replacement fuse has a rating of 13 amps and that it is approved by ASTA or BSI to BS1362.

Check for the ASTA mark or the BSI mark on the body of the fuse.

If the plug contains a removable fuse cover, you must ensure that it is refitted when the fuse is replaced. If you lose the fuse cover, the plug must not be used until a replacement cover is obtained. A replacement fuse cover can be purchased from an Authorised Service Center.

If the fitted moulded plug is unsuitable for the mains socket in your home, then the fuse should be removed and the plug cut off and disposed of safely. There is a danger of severe electrical shock if the cut off plug is inserted into any 13 amp socket.

If a new plug is to be fitted, please observe the wiring code as shown below. If in any doubt, please consult a qualified electrician.

As the colours of the wire in the mains lead of this appliance may not correspond with the coloured markings identifying the terminals in your plug, proceed as follows.

The wire which is coloured GREEN - AND - YELLOW must be connected to the terminal in the plug which is marked with the letter E or by the Earth symbol $\frac{1}{2}$ or coloured GREEN or GREEN - AND - YELLOW.

The wire which is coloured BLUE must be connected to the terminal in the plug which is marked with the letter N or coloured BLACK.

The wire which is coloured BROWN must be connected to the terminal in the plug which is marked with the letter L or coloured RED.

How to replace the fuse: Open the fuse compartment with a screwdriver and replace the fuse.

WARNING:

POWER

The wall outlet or the circuit breaker shall be installed near the equipment and shall be easily accessible when problems occur. If the following problems occur, cut off the power supply immediately.

Continued use of the projector in these conditions will result in fire or electric shock.

- If foreign objects or water get inside the projector, cut off the power supply.
- If the projector is dropped or the cabinet is broken, cut off the power supply.
- If you notice smoke, strange smells or noise coming from the projector, cut off the power supply.
- Please contact an Authorized Service Center for repairs, and do not attempt to repair the projector yourself.

During a thunderstorm, do not touch the projector or the cable.

Electric shocks can result.

Do not do anything that might damage the power cord or the power plug.

If the power cord is used while damaged, electric shocks, short-circuits or fire will result.

• Do not damage the power cord, make any modifications to it, place it near any hot objects, bend it excessively, twist it, pull it, place heavy objects on top of it or wrap it into a bundle.

Ask an Authorized Service Center to carry out any repairs to the power cord that might be necessary.

Completely insert the power plug into the wall outlet and the power connector into the projector terminal.

- If the plug is not inserted correctly, electric shocks or overheating will result.
- Do not use plugs which are damaged or wall outlets which are coming loose from the wall.

Do not use anything other than the provided power cord.

Failure to observe this will result in fire or electric shocks. Please note that if you do not use the provided power cord to ground the device on the side of the outlet, this may result in electric shocks.

Clean the power plug regularly to prevent it from becoming covered in dust.

Failure to observe this will cause a fire.

- If dust builds up on the power plug, the resulting humidity can damage the insulation.
- If not using the projector for an extended period of time, pull the power plug out from the wall outlet.

Pull the power plug out from the wall outlet and wipe it with a dry cloth regularly.

Do not handle the power plug and power connector with wet hands.

Failure to observe this will result in electric shocks.

Do not overload the wall outlet.

If the power supply is overloaded (ex., by using too many adapters), overheating may occur and fire will result.

ON USE/INSTALLATION

Do not place the projector on soft materials such as carpets or sponge mats.

Doing so will cause the projector to overheat, which can cause burns, fire or damage to the projector.

Do not set up the projector in humid or dusty places or in places where the projector may come into contact with oily smoke or steam, ex. a bathroom.

Using the projector under such conditions will result in fire, electric shocks or deterioration of components. Deterioration of components (such as ceiling mount brackets) may cause the projector which is mounted on the ceiling to fall down.

Do not install this projector in a place which is not strong enough to take the full weight of the projector or on top of a surface which is sloped or unstable.

Failure to observe this will cause projector to fall down or tip over the projector, and severe injury or damage could result.

WARNING:

Do not cover the air intake/exhaust ports.

Doing so will cause the projector to overheat, which can cause fire or damage to the projector.

- Do not place the projector in narrow, badly ventilated places.
- Do not place the projector on cloth or papers, as these materials could be drawn into the air intake port.
- Provide at least 1 m (40") of space between any walls or objects and the exhaust port, and at least 50 cm (20") of space between any walls or objects and the intake port.

Do not place your hands or other objects close to the air exhaust port.

Doing so will cause burns or damage your hands or other objects.

• Heated air comes out of the air exhaust port. Do not place your hands or face, or objects which cannot withstand heat close to this port.

Do not look at or place your skin into the light emitted from the lens while the projector is being used. Doing so can cause burns or loss of sight.

- Strong light is emitted from the projector's lens. Do not look at or place your hands directly into this light.
- Be especially careful not to let young children look into the lens. In addition, turn off the power and disconnect the power plug when you are away from the projector.

Never attempt to remodel or disassemble the projector.

High voltages can cause fire or electric shocks.

• For any inspection, adjustment and repair work, please contact an Authorized Service Center.

Do not project an image with the lens cover attached.

Doing so can cause fire.

Do not allow metal objects, flammable objects, or liquids to enter inside of the projector. Do not allow the projector to get wet.

Doing so may cause short circuits or overheating, and result in fire, electric shock, or malfunction of the projector.

- Do not place containers of liquid or metal objects near the projector.
- If liquid enters inside of the projector, consult your dealer.
- Particular attention must be paid to children.

Use the ceiling mount bracket specified by Panasonic.

Using the ceiling mount bracket other than the specified one will result in falling accidents.

• Attach the supplied safety cable to the ceiling mount bracket to prevent the projector from falling down.

Installation work (such as ceiling mount bracket) should only be carried out by a qualified technician. If installation is not carried out and secured correctly, it can cause injury or accidents, such as electric shocks.

Be sure to use the wire provided with the ceiling mount bracket as an extra safety measure to prevent the projector from falling down. (Install in a different location to the ceiling mount bracket.)

WARNING:

ACCESSORIES

Do not use or handle the batteries improperly, and refer to the following.

Failure to observe this will cause burns, batteries to leak, overheat, explode or catch fire.

- Use AAA/R03/LR03 batteries.
- Do not use unspecified batteries.
- Do not use chargeable batteries.
- Do not disassemble dry cell batteries.
- Do not heat the batteries or place them into water or fire.
- Do not allow the + and terminals of the batteries to come into contact with metallic objects such as necklaces or hairpins.
- Do not store or carry batteries together with metallic objects.
- Store the batteries in a plastic bag and keep them away from metallic objects.
- Make sure the polarities (+ and –) are correct when inserting the batteries.
- Do not use a new battery together with an old battery or mix different types of batteries.
- Do not use batteries with the outer cover peeling away or removed.

If the battery fluid leaks, do not touch it with bare hands, and take the following measures if necessary.

- Battery fluid on your skin or clothing could result in skin inflammation or injury. Rinse with clean water and seek medical advice immediately.
- Battery fluid coming in contact with your eyes could result in loss of sight. In this case, do not rub your eyes. Rinse with clean water and seek medical advice immediately.

Do not remove unspecified screws during the lamp unit replacement.

Doing so can cause electric shocks, burns, or injury.

Do not disassemble the lamp unit.

If the lamp breaks, it could cause injury.

Lamp replacement

The lamp has high internal pressure. If improperly handled, an explosion and severe injury or accidents will result.

- The lamp can easily explode if struck against hard objects or dropped.
- Before replacing the lamp unit, be sure to turn the power off and to disconnect the power plug from the wall outlet.

Electric shocks or explosions can result if this is not done.

• When replacing the lamp unit, turn the power off and allow the lamp to cool for at least one hour before handling it otherwise it can cause burns.

Do not use the supplied power cord with devices other than this projector.

• Using the supplied power cord with devices other than this projector may cause short circuits or overheating, and result in electric shock or fire.

Do not allow children to reach the batteries (AAA/R03/LR03).

- Accidentally swallowing them can cause physical harm.
 - If swallowed, seek medical advice immediately.

Remove the depleted batteries from the remote control promptly.

• Leaving them in the unit may result in fluid leakage, overheating, or explosion of the batteries.

CAUTION:

POWER

When disconnecting the power cord, be sure to hold the power plug and power connector.

If the power cord itself is pulled, the lead will become damaged, and fire, short-circuits or serious electric shocks will result.

When not using the projector for an extended period of time, disconnect the power plug from the wall outlet.

Failure to do so may result in fire or electric shock.

Disconnect the power plug from the wall outlet before carrying out any cleaning and replacing the unit. Failure to do so may result in electric shock.

ON USE/INSTALLATION

Do not place heavy objects on top of the projector.

Failure to observe this will cause the projector to become unbalanced and fall, which could result in damage or injury. The projector will be damaged or deformed.

Do not put your weight on this projector.

You could fall or the projector could break, and injury will result.

• Be especially careful not to let young children stand or sit on the projector.

Do not place the projector in extremely hot locations.

Doing so will cause the outer casing or internal components to deteriorate, or result in fire.

• Take particular care in locations exposed to direct sunlight or near stoves.

Do not place your hands in the openings beside the optical lens, while shifting the lens.

Failure to observe this could cause injury.

Do not stand in front of the lens while the projector is being used.

Doing so can cause damage and burns to clothing.

• Extremely strong light is emitted from the projector's lens.

Do not place objects in front of the lens while the projector is being used.

- Doing so can cause damage to the object and can cause the set to malfunction.
- Extremely strong light is emitted from the projector's lens.

Always disconnect all cables before moving the projector.

Moving the projector with cables still attached can damage the cables, which will cause fire or electric shocks to occur.

When mounting the projector on the ceiling, keep mounting screws and power cord from contact with metal parts inside the ceiling.

Contact with metal parts inside the ceiling can cause electric shocks.

ACCESSORIES

Do not use the old lamp unit.

If used it could cause lamp explosion.

If the lamp has broken, ventilate the room immediately. Do not touch or bring your face close to the broken pieces.

Failure to observe this will cause the user to absorb the gas which was released when the lamp broke and which contains nearly the same amount of mercury as fluorescent lamps, and the broken pieces will cause injury.

- If you believe that you have absorbed the gas or that the gas has got into your eyes or mouth, seek medical advice immediately.
- Ask your dealer about replacing the lamp unit and check the inside of the projector.

When not using the projector for an extended period of time, remove the batteries from the remote control.

Failure to observe this will cause the batteries to leak, overheat, catch fire or explode, which may result in fire or contamination of surrounding area.

CAUTION:

MAINTENANCE

Do not attach the air filter unit while it is wet.

Doing so may result in electric shock or malfunctions.

• After you clean the air filter units, dry them thoroughly before reattaching them.

Ask your dealer about cleaning inside the projector once a year.








BRASIL

Após o uso, as pilhas e/ou baterias deverão ser entregues ao estabelecimento comercial ou rede de assistência técnica autorizada.

Cobrir os terminais positivo (+) e negativo (-) com uma fita isolante adesiva, antes de depositar numa caixa destinada para o recolhimento. O contato entre partes metálicas pode causar vazamentos, gerar calor, romper a blindagem e produzir fogo. (Fig. 1)

Fig. 1 Como isolar os terminais




Não desmonte, não remova o invólucro, nem amasse a bateria. O gás liberado pela bateria pode irritar a garganta, danificar o lacre do invólucro ou o vazamento provocar calor, ruptura da blindagem e produzir fogo devido ao curto circuito dos terminais. Não incinere nem aqueça as baterias, elas não podem ficar expostas a temperaturas superiores a 100 °C (212 °F). O gás liberado pela bateria pode irritar a garganta, danificar o lacre do invólucro ou o vazamento provocar calor, ruptura da blindagem e produzir fogo devido ao curto circuito dos terminais.



Chapter 1 **Preparation**


This chapter describes things you need to know or check before using the projector.

Precautions for use

Cautions when transporting

If you purchased the projector with the standard zoom lens, remove the lens cushion before use, and store it for the future use. When transporting the projector, move the lens to the home position and attach the lens cushion and the lens cover.
 If you purchased the projector with the lens sold separately, remove the lens hole cover before use, and store it for the future use. When transporting the projector, move the projection lens to the home position, remove the Projection Lens, and then attach the lens hole cover.

For the steps to move the lens to the home position, refer to "Moving the lens to the home position" (> page 52).



- When transporting the projector, hold it securely by its bottom and avoid excessive vibration and impacts. They may damage
 the internal components and result in malfunctions.
- Do not transport the projector with the adjustable feet extended. Doing so may damage the adjustable feet.

Cautions when installing

Do not set up the projector outdoors.

The projector is designed for indoor use only.

Do not set up the projector in the following locations.

- Places where vibration and impacts occur such as in a car or vehicle: Doing so may cause damage to internal components or malfunction.
- Near the exhaust of an air conditioner: Depending on the conditions of use, the screen may fluctuate in rare cases due to the heated air from the air exhaust port or the hot or cooled air. Make sure that the exhaust from the projector or other equipment, or the air from the air conditioner does not blow toward the front of the projector.
- Places with sharp temperature fluctuations such as near lights (studio lamps): Doing so may shorten the life of the lamp, or result in deformation of the outer case due to heat, which may cause malfunctions.

The operating environment temperature of the projector should be between 0 °C (32 °F) and 45 °C (113 °F) when using it at elevations lower than 1 400 m (4 593') above sea level, and between 0 °C (32 °F) and 40 °C (104 °F) when using it at high altitudes (between 1 400 m (4 593') and 2 700 m (8 858') above sea level).

• Near high-voltage power lines or near motors: Doing so may interfere with the operation of the projector.

Be sure to ask a specialized technician or your dealer when installing the projector on a ceiling.

The optional Ceiling Mount Bracket is required. Model No.: ET-PKE200H (for High Ceilings), ET-PKE200S (for Low Ceilings), ET-PKE200B (Projector Mount Base)

Ask a qualified technician or your dealer to install the cable wiring for DIGITAL LINK connection.

Image and sound may be disrupted if cable transmission characteristics cannot be obtained due to inadequate installation.

The projector may not work properly due to strong radio wave from the broadcast station or the radio.

If there is any facility or equipment, which outputs strong radio wave, near the installation location, install the projector at a location sufficiently far from the source of the radio wave. Or, wrap the LAN cable connected to the <DIGITAL LINK/LAN> terminal by using a piece of metal foil or a metal pipe, of which is grounded at both ends.

Projection Lens

Be sure to use the standard zoom lens supplied with the projector (PT-EZ770Z, PT-EW730Z, PT-EX800Z only) or the specified Projection Lens (optional). The standard zoom lens supplied with PT-EZ570 series, PT-EW630 series, PT-EW530 series, PT-EX600 series, PT-EX500 series is different from the lens of this projector. Using it may result in malfunction or damage. Do not use it.

Focus adjustment

The projection lens is thermally affected by the light from the light source, making the focus unstable in the period just after switching on the power. Before adjusting the lens focus, wait at least 30 minutes with the image projected.

Do not install the projector at elevations of 2 700 m (8 858') or higher above sea level.

Doing so may shorten the life of the components and result in malfunctions.

Do not use the projector tilted to the right or left.


Using the projector at a vertical angle that exceeds 15° may reduce product life or result in malfunction.

Cautions when setting up the projector

• When installing and using the projector with a method other than the floor standing installation using the adjustable feet, fix the projector using the four screw holes for ceiling mount (as shown in the figure).

(Screw diameter: M6, tapping depth inside the set: 12 mm (15/32"), torque: 4 ± 0.5 N·m)


Prevent a gap forming between the setting surface and the screw holes for ceiling mount on the projector bottom, for example, by inserting spacers (metallic) between them.



The positions of screw holes for ceiling mount and adjustable feet

- Use the adjustable feet only for the floor standing installation and for adjusting the angle. Using them for other purposes may damage the projector.
- Do not stack projectors on top of each other.
- Do not use the projector supporting it by the top.
- Do not use the projector tilted at an angle that exceeds ±15° from the horizontal plane.
- Do not block the ventilation ports (intake and exhaust) of the projector.

 Prevent hot and cool air from the air conditioning system to blow directly to the ventilation ports (intake and exhaust) of the projector.



100 mm (4") or longer

• Do not install the projector in a confined space.

When installing the projector in a confined space, provide air conditioning or ventilation separately. Exhaust heat may accumulate when the ventilation is not enough, triggering the protection circuit of the projector.

"DIGITAL LINK" is a technology that uses a twisted-pair-cable to transmit video, audio, Ethernet, and serial control signals. The projector supports the optional Digital Interface Box (Model No.: ET-YFB100G) and the "XTP transmitter" of Extron Electronics. For the twisted-pair-cable transmitter of other manufacturers of which the operation has been verified with this projector, refer to Panasonic website (http://panasonic.net/avc/projector/). Note that the verification for devices of other manufacturers has been made for the items set by Panasonic Corporation, and not all the operations have been verified. For operation or performance problems caused by the devices of other manufacturers, contact the respective manufacturers.

Cautions on use

■ To get a good picture quality

• In order to view a beautiful image in higher contrast, prepare an appropriate environment. Draw curtains or blinds over windows and turn off any lights near the screen to prevent outside light or light from indoor lamps from shining onto the screen.

Do not touch the surface of the Projection Lens with your bare hands.

If the surface of the Projection Lens becomes dirty from fingerprints or anything else, this will be magnified and projected onto the screen.

Attach the lens cover supplied with the projector or the optional Projection Lens when you do not use the projector.

LCD panel

• The LCD panel is precision-made. Note that in rare cases, pixels of high precision could be missing or always lit. Note that such phenomena do not indicate malfunction. If still images are projected for a long time, a residual image may remain on the LCD panel. Note that the residual image may not disappear.

Optical parts

When the operating environment temperature is high or in environments where lots of dust, cigarette smoke, etc. is present, the replacement cycle of the LCD panel, deflection panel and other optical parts may be shorter even if used for less than one year. Consult your dealer for details.

Do not move the projector or subject it to vibration or impact while it is operating.

Doing so may shorten the life of the built-in motor.

Lamp

The light source of the projector is a high-pressure mercury lamp.

- A high-pressure mercury lamp has the following characteristics.
- The luminance of the lamp will decrease by duration of usage.
- The lamp may burst with a loud sound or have its service life shortened because of shock, chipping, or degradation due to cumulative runtime.
- The lamp life varies greatly depending on individual differences and usage conditions. In particular, continuous use for 12 hours or more and frequent off/on switching of the power greatly deteriorate the lamp and affects the lamp life.
- In rare cases, the lamps burst shortly after projection starts.
- The risk of bursting increases when the lamp is used beyond its replacement cycle. Make sure to replace the lamp unit regularly.
 - ("When to replace the lamp unit" (+ page 133), "How to replace the lamp unit" (+ page 133))
- If the lamp bursts, gas contained inside of the lamp is released in the form of smoke.
- It is recommended that you store the Replacement Lamp Unit as a contingency.

Computer and external device connections

• When connecting a computer or an external device, read this manual carefully regarding the use of power cords and shielded cables as well.

Disposal

To dispose of the product, ask your local authorities or dealer for correct methods of disposal.

The lamp contains mercury. When disposing of used lamp units, contact your local authorities or dealer for correct methods of disposal.

- 2) Insert the batteries and close the cover (insert the side first). (Fig. 2)
 When removing the batteries, perform the steps in reverse order.

Setting the ID number of the remote control

When you use the system with multiple projectors, you can operate all the projectors simultaneously or each projector individually using single remote control, if a unique ID number is assigned to each projector.

After setting the ID number of the projector, set same ID number on the remote control.

The factory default ID number of the projector is set to [ALL]. When using a single projector, press the <ID ALL> button on the remote control. Also, you can control a projector by pressing the <ID ALL> button on the remote control even if you do not know the projector ID.

How to set

- 1) Press the <ID SET> button on the remote control.
- 2) Within five seconds, press the two-digit ID number set on the projector using the number (<0> <9>) buttons.

• If you press the <ID ALL> button, you can control the projectors regardless of the ID number setting of the projector.

Attention

- Since the ID number of the remote control can be set without the projector, do not press the <ID SET> button on the remote control carelessly. If the <ID SET> button is pressed and no number (<0> <9>) buttons are pressed within five seconds, the ID number returns to its original value before the <ID SET> button was pressed.
- The ID number set on the remote control will be stored unless it is set again. However, it will be erased if the remote control is left with dead batteries. Set the same ID number again when the batteries are replaced.


Note

• Set the ID number of the projector from the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu \rightarrow [PROJECTOR ID].

Connecting to the projector with a cable

When controlling the projector by wired remote control, connect the <REMOTE 1 IN> terminal on the projector to the remote control wired terminal on the remote control by a commercial M3 stereo mini jack cable.

The remote control is effective even in places where an obstacle stands in the light path or where devices are susceptible to outside light.



Attention

• Use a cable that is 15 m (49'3") or shorter, with dual core shielded. The remote control may not operate when the length of the cable exceeds 15 m (49'3") or when the shielding of the cable is inadequate.





Setting up

Installation mode

There are four ways to set up the projector. Set the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu \rightarrow [PROJECTION METHOD] (\Rightarrow page 88) depending on the installation method.





Parts for ceiling mount (optional)

You can install the projector on the ceiling using the optional Ceiling Mount Bracket (Model No.: ET-PKE200H (for High Ceilings), ET-PKE200S (for Low Ceilings), and ET-PKE200B (Projector Mount Base)).


- Be sure to use the Ceiling Mount Bracket specified for this projector.
- Refer to the Installation Instructions supplied with the Ceiling Mount Bracket when installing the projector with the bracket.

Attention

• To ensure projector performance and security, installation of the Ceiling Mount Bracket must be carried out by your dealer or a qualified technician.

Projected image size and throw distance

Refer to the projected image size and projection distance shown below to install the projector. The image size and image position can be adjusted in accordance with the screen size and screen position.

Adjusting adjustable feet

Install the projector on a flat surface so that the front of the projector is parallel to the screen surface and the projected image is rectangular. If the screen is tilted downward, the projected image can be adjusted to be rectangular by adjusting the front adjustable feet. The adjustable feet can also be used to adjust the projector to be level when it is tilted in the horizontal direction.

Extend the adjustable feet by rotating in the direction shown in the figure and retract by rotating in the opposite direction.



Adjustable amount

Front adjustable feet: Approx. 25 mm (31/32")

• Heated air is expelled from the air exhaust port while the lamp is lit. Do not touch the air exhaust port directly when adjusting the adjustable feet. (+ page 27)

Removing/attaching the Projection Lens



- Replace the Projection Lens after turning off the power of the projector.
- · Do not touch the electrical contact of the Projection Lens. Dust or dirt may cause defective contact.
- Do not touch the surface of the Projection Lens with your bare hands.
- Before attaching the Projection Lens, remove the lens hole cover (only lens options models) and lens cover attached to the Projection Lens.

Removing the Projection Lens

Remove the Projection Lens with the following procedure.




1) With the lens release button held down, turn the Projection Lens counterclockwise to the end and remove the Projection Lens.

Store the removed Projection Lens where it will be free from vibration and impact.

Attaching the Projection Lens

1) Align the red mark on the Projection Lens with the red mark on the projector, and insert the Projection Lens as far as possible. (Fig. 1)

2) Turn clockwise to the end. (Fig. 2)

[•] Turn the Projection Lens counterclockwise to confirm that it does not come out.

Connecting

Before connecting

- · Before connecting, carefully read the operating instructions for the external device to be connected.
- Turn off the power of all devices before connecting cables.
- Take note of the following points before connecting the cables. Failure to do so may result in malfunctions.
- When connecting a cable to a device connected to the projector or the projector itself, touch any nearby metallic objects to eliminate static electricity from your body before performing work.
- Do not use unnecessarily long cables to connect to a device connected to the projector or to the projector body. The longer the cable, the
 more it is susceptible to noise. Since using a cable while it is wound makes it act like an antenna, it is more susceptible to noise.
- When connecting cables, connect GND first, then insert the connecting terminal of the connecting device in a straight manner.
- Acquire any connection cable necessary to connect the external device to the system that is neither supplied with the device nor available as an option.
- If video signals from video equipment contain too much jitter, the images on the screen may wobble. In this case, a time base corrector (TBC) must be connected.
- The projector accepts video signals, Y/C signals, YC_BC_R/YP_BP_R signals, analog RGB signals (synchronization signals are TTL level), and digital signals.
- Some computer models or graphics cards are not compatible with the projector.
- Use a cable compensator when you connect devices to the projector using long cables. Otherwise the image may not display properly.
- Refer to "List of compatible signals" (+ page 148) for the types of video signals that can be used with the projector.







- For an HDMI cable, use an HDMI High Speed cable that conforms to HDMI standards. If a cable that does not conform to HDMI standards is used, images may be interrupted or may not be displayed.
- The <HDMI IN> terminal of the projector can be connected to an external device with a DVI-D terminal by using an HDMI/DVI conversion cable, but some devices may not project the image properly or function properly.
- The <DVI-D IN> terminal supports single links only.
- For the DisplayPort cable, use a DisplayPort cable that conforms to DisplayPort standards. If a cable that does not conform to DisplayPort standards is used, the image may be interrupted or may not be displayed.
- When entering the SYNC ON GREEN signal, do not enter sync signals to the <SYNC/HD> terminal or the <VD> terminal.
- If you operate the projector using the computer with the resume feature (last memory), you may have to reset the resume feature to operate the projector.

Connecting example: Twisted-pair-cable transmitter

Twisted-pair-cable transmitters such as the optional Digital Interface Box (Model No.: ET-YFB100G) use twisted-pair-cables to transmit input images, audio, Ethernet, and serial control signals, and the projector can input those digital signals to the <DIGITAL LINK/LAN> terminal.



Attention

- Always use one of the following when connecting a VCR.
 - A VCR with built-in time base corrector (TBC)
 - A time base corrector (TBC) between the projector and the VCR
- If nonstandard burst signals are connected, the image may be distorted. In such case, connect the time base corrector (TBC) between the projector and the external devices.
- Ask a qualified technician or your dealer to install the cable wiring for a twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector. Image and sound
 may be disrupted if cable transmission characteristics cannot be obtained due to inadequate installation.
- · For the LAN cable between a twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector, use a cable that meets the following criteria:
- Compatible with CAT5e or higher
- Shielded type (including connectors)
- Straight-through
- Single wire
- When laying cables between a twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector, check that cable characteristics are compatible with CAT5e or higher using tools such as a cable tester or cable analyzer.
- When using a relay connector midway, include it in the measurement.
- Do not use a hub between a twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector.
- When connecting to the projector using a twisted-pair-cable transmitter (receiver) of other manufacturer, do not place another twisted-paircable transmitter between the twisted-pair-cable transmitter of other manufacturer and the projector. This may cause image and sound to be disrupted.
- Do not pull cables forcefully. Also, do not bend or fold cables unnecessarily.
- To reduce the effects of noise as much as possible, stretch out the cables between the twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector without any loops.
- . Lay the cables between a twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector away from other cables, particularly power cables.
- When installing multiple cables, run them side by side along the shortest distance possible without bundling them together.
- After laying the cables, confirm that the value of [SIGNAL QUALITY] in the [NETWORK] menu → [DIGITAL LINK STATUS] is displayed in green (indicates normal quality). (+ page 110)

Note

- For an HDMI cable, use an HDMI High Speed cable that conforms to HDMI standards. If a cable that does not conform to HDMI standards is used, images may be interrupted or may not be displayed.
- The projector does not support VIERA Link (HDMI).
- The maximum transmission distance between the twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector is 100 m (328'1"). If this distance is exceeded, image and sound may be disrupted and may cause a malfunction in LAN communication. Please note that we do not support the use of the projector outside the maximum transmission distance.
- For twisted-pair-cable transmitter of other manufacturers of which the operation has been verified with the DIGITAL LINK compatible
 projector, refer to Panasonic website (http://panasonic.net/avc/projector/). Note that the verification for devices of other manufacturers
 has been made for the items set by Panasonic Corporation, and not all the operations have been verified. For operation or performance
 problems caused by the devices of other manufacturers, contact the respective manufacturers.

Chapter 3 Basic Operations


This chapter describes basic operations to start with.

Switching on/off the projector

Connecting the power cord

Make sure that the supplied power cord is securely fixed to the projector body to prevent it from being removed easily. Confirm that the <MAIN POWER> switch is on the <OFF> side before connecting the power cord. For details of power cord handling, refer to "Read this first!" (page 2).

Attaching the power cord



 Check the shapes of the <AC IN> terminal on the rear of the projector body and the power cord connector, and insert the plug completely in the correct direction (until you hear the side tabs click in place).


Removing the power cord



- 1) Confirm that the <MAIN POWER> switch on the rear of the projector body is on the <OFF> side, and remove the power plug from the outlet.
- 2) Remove the power cord connector from the <AC IN> terminal of the projector body while pressing the side tabs.

Power indicator

Displays the status of the power. Check the <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> status of the power indicator before operating the projector.




Indicator status		Projector status
Off		The main power is switched off.
Red	Lit	 The power is switched off (in standby mode). Projection will start when the power on < I> button is pressed. The projector may not operate when the lamp indicator <lamp> or temperature indicator <temp> is flashing. (⇒ page 129)</temp></lamp>
Green	Lit	Projecting.
Orange	Lit	The projector is preparing to switch off the projector. The power is switched off after a while. (Changes to the standby mode.)

Note

- While the power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> is lit in orange, the fan is running to cool the projector.
- For about 75 seconds after the projector is switched off and the luminous lamp cooling is started, the lamp indicators do not light up even if the power is switched on. After the power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> lights in red, turn on the power again.
- The projector consumes power even in standby mode (power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> lit in red). Refer to "Power consumption"
 (⇒ page 151) for the power consumption.
- The power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> will flash if the projector receives a remote control signal.
- The power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> will flash slowly in green while the shutter is closed.
- If the power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> is flashing in red, consult your dealer.

Switching on the projector

When using the optional Projection Lens, attach the Projection Lens before switching on the projector. Remove the lens cover first.



- 1) Connect the power cord to the projector body.
- Connect the power plug to an outlet.
 (AC 100 V 240 V, 50 Hz/60 Hz)
- 3) Press the <ON> side of the <MAIN POWER> switch to turn on the power.

• After a short while, the power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> will light in red, and the projector will enter the standby mode.

4) Press the power $\langle 0/| \rangle$ button on the control panel or the power on $\langle | \rangle$ button on the remote control.


• The power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> lights in green and the image is soon projected on the screen.

Note

- If the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu → [ECO MANAGEMENT] → [STANDBY MODE] is set to [ECO], it may take approx. 10 seconds longer before the projector starts projecting after the power is turned on, compared with when [NORMAL] is set.
- If the <MAIN POWER> switch was set to <OFF> during projection to end the projection using the direct power off function last time, and the <MAIN POWER> switch is set to <ON> with the power plug connected to the outlet, the power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> will light in green and the image will soon be projected on the screen.

Making adjustments and selections

It is recommended that images be projected continuously for at least 30 minutes before the focus is adjusted.



1) Press the <FOCUS> button to roughly adjust the focus of the image. (⇒ page 51)

2) Change the setting of [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu → [PROJECTION METHOD] depending on the installation mode. (→ page 33)


• Refer to "Navigating through the menu" (> page 59) for the operation of the menu screen.

- 3) Press the <INPUT> button on the control panel or the input selection (<RGB1/2>, <DIGITAL LINK>, <DVI-D>, <VIDEO>, <DisplayPort>, <HDMI>) buttons on the remote control to select the input.
- 4) Adjust the front, back and sideway tilt of the projector with the adjustable feet. (+ page 40)
- 5) Press the <SHIFT> button to adjust the position of the image.
- 6) If the input signal is an RGB signal, press the <AUTO SETUP> button.
- 7) Press the <ZOOM> button to adjust the size of the image to match the screen.
- 8) Press the <FOCUS> button again to adjust the focus.
- 9) Press the <ZOOM> button again to adjust the zoom and the size of the image to match the screen.

Note

 When the projector is switched on for the first time after purchase as well as when [ALL USER DATA] in the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu → [INITIALIZE] is executed, the focus adjustment screen is displayed after projection starts, then the initial setting screen is displayed. Refer to "Start-up display" (→ page 24) for details.

Switching off the projector



1) Press the power <⊕/ |> button on the control panel or the power standby <⊕> button on the remote control.

• The [POWER OFF(STANDBY)] confirmation screen is displayed.

2) Press **♦** to select [OK], and press the **<**ENTER> button.

(Or press the power $\langle 0/| \rangle$ button on the control panel or the power standby $\langle 0 \rangle$ button on the remote control again.)

- Projection of the image will stop, and the power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> on the projector body lights in orange. (The fan keeps running.)
- 3) Wait for about 100 seconds until the power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> on the projector body lights in red.
- 4) Press the <OFF> side of the <MAIN POWER> switch to turn off the power.

Note

• Do not switch on the projector and project images immediately after switching off the projector.

The projector consumes power even when the power <₀/|> button on the control panel or the power standby <₀> button on the remote control is pressed and the projector is switched off if the main power of the projector is on.
 When the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu → [ECO MANAGEMENT] → [STANDBY MODE] is set to [ECO], use of some functions is restricted, but the power consumption during standby can be conserved.

Turning on the power while the lamp is still hot may shorten the lamp life.

[•] For about 75 seconds after the projector is switched off and the luminous lamp cooling is started, the lamp indicators will not light up even if the power is switched on. Even after 75 seconds, the lamp may not light up if the projector is switched on. In such a case, after the power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> lights in red, switch on the projector again.

Direct power off function

The projector can be turned off during projection or immediately after the luminous lamp is turned off by setting the <MAIN POWER> switch to <OFF>. Also, when the projector is mounted on the ceiling or installed in an environment where the <MAIN POWER> switch of the projector cannot be easily turned <OFF>, the power can be turned off directly using the circuit breaker. It is also safe in case a power outage occurs or the power cord is pulled out immediately after the projector is switched off.

Note

- If the projector was turned off by turning off the circuit breaker directly during projection last time, then the power indicator <ON (G)/ STANDBY (R)> will light in green a while after the circuit breaker is turned on, and then projection of the image will start.
- If the power was turned off directly by turning the <MAIN POWER> switch to <OFF>, or the power was turned off by turning off the circuit breaker directly, projection may take a longer time than usual to start when the projector is switched on the next time.

Projecting

Check the attachment of the Projection Lens (→ page 41), external device connection (→ page 42), power cord connection (→ page 47), and switch on the projector (→ page 48) to start projecting. Select the image for projection, and adjust appearance of the projected image.

Selecting the input signal

Select an input signal.

1) Press the <INPUT> button on the control panel or the input selection (<RGB1/2>, <DIGITAL LINK>, <DVI-D>, <VIDEO>, <DisplayPort>, <HDMI>) buttons on the remote control.

• The image of the signal being input in the selected terminal is projected.

Attention

- Images may not be projected properly depending on the external device, or the Blu-ray disc or DVD disc, to be played back. Set the [PICTURE] menu → [SYSTEM SELECTOR].
- Confirm the aspect ratio of the projection screen and the image, and switch to an optimum aspect ratio from the [POSITION] menu → [ASPECT].

Adjusting the focus, zoom, and shift

If the projected image or the position is not correct when the positioning of the projector and the screen is correctly installed, adjust the focus, zoom, and shift.

Using the control panel

- 1) Press the <LENS> button on the control panel.
 - Pressing the button changes the adjustment screen in the order of [FOCUS], [ZOOM], and [SHIFT].

2) Select each item and press ▲▼◀▶ to adjust it.

Using the remote control

- 1) Press the lens (<FOCUS>, <ZOOM>, <SHIFT>) buttons on the remote control.
 - <FOCUS> button: Adjusts focus.
 - <ZOOM> button: Adjusts zoom.
 - <SHIFT> button: Adjusts shift.

2) Select each item and press ▲▼◀▶ to adjust it.

Caution

During the lens shift operation, do not insert your hand in any opening around the lens. Your hand may be caught and result in injuries.

Note

- When the Projection Lens without the zoom function is attached, the zoom adjustment screen will be displayed. However, operation is not possible.
- Use the fixed-focus lens (Model No.: ET-ELW21) with the lens position set to the home position. (+ page 52)
- The adjustment can be performed quickly by pressing and holding **AV(**) for at least three seconds.
- It is recommended that images be projected continuously for at least 30 minutes before the focus is adjusted.
- Only [FOCUS] is shown in yellow so that the displayed menu item can be recognized by color, even when the projector is not focused and displayed characters are unreadable. (Factory default)

The display color of [FOCUS] depends on the setting of the [DISPLAY OPTION] menu \rightarrow [ON-SCREEN DISPLAY] \rightarrow [OSD DESIGN].

Moving the lens to the home position

To move the lens to the home position, perform the following procedure.

- 1) While the [SHIFT] adjustment screen is displayed, press the <DEFAULT> button on the remote control.
 - The [HOME POSITION] screen is displayed.

- 2) While the [HOME POSITION] screen is displayed (for approximately five seconds), press the <ENTER> button.
 - [PROGRESS] is displayed in the [HOME POSITION] screen, and the lens returns to the home position.


Note

- The home position of the lens is the lens position when the lens is being replaced or when the projector is being stored, and it is not the optical center of the screen.
- You can also display the [HOME POSITION] screen by pressing the <LENS> button on the control panel or the <SHIFT> button on the remote control for at least three seconds.

Adjustment range by the lens position shift (optical shift)

Perform the lens position shift within the adjustment range.

The focus may change when the lens position is shifted out of the adjustment range. This is because the movement of the lens is restricted to protect the optical parts. Projection position can be adjusted with the optical axis shift based on the standard projection position in the respective range.



Note


• When the optional fixed-focus lens (Model No.: ET-ELW21) is attached, shift adjustment is not available.

Operating with the remote control



Switching the input

The input for projection can be switched.



1) Press the input selection (<RGB1/2>, <DIGITAL LINK>, <DVI-D>, <VIDEO>, <DisplayPort>, <HDMI>) buttons.

• This operation can be also performed using the <INPUT> button on the control panel.

<rgb1 2=""></rgb1>	Switches the input to RGB1 or RGB2. Switches to another input when one input has already been chosen.
<digital link=""></digital>	Switches the input to DIGITAL LINK.
<dvi-d></dvi-d>	Switches the input to DVI-D.
<video></video>	Switch the input to VIDEO.
<displayport></displayport>	Switches the input to DisplayPort.
<hdmi></hdmi>	Switch the input to HDMI.

Note

When the optional Digital Interface Box (Model No.: ET-YFB100G) is connected to the <DIGITAL LINK/LAN> terminal, the ET-YFB100G input changes with each press of the <DIGITAL LINK> button. The input can also be changed using the control command of RS-232C. For twisted-pair-cable transmitters of other manufacturers, switch the input on the projector to DIGITAL LINK, and then switch the input on the twisted-pair-cable transmitter.

Using the shutter function

If the projector is not used for a certain period of time during the meeting intermission, for example, it is possible to turn off the image and audio temporarily.



1) Press the <SHUTTER> button.

- The image and audio disappear.
- This operation can be also performed using the <SHUTTER> button on the control panel.

2) Press the <SHUTTER> button again.

• The image and audio reappear.

Attention

When the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu → [ECO MANAGEMENT] → [SHUTTER DETECTION] is set to [ON], do not switch the shutter on (closed)/off (open) in a short time.

Note

• The power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> will flash slowly in green while the shutter function is in use.

Using the mute function

Audio can be temporarily turned off.



1) Press the <MUTE> button.

• The audio disappears.

2) Press the <MUTE> button again.

• The audio reappears.

Adjusting the volume

The volume of the built-in speaker or audio output can be adjusted.

1) Press the <VOL-> button/<VOL+> button on the remote control.

• This operation can be also performed using the <VOL-> button/<VOL+> button on the control panel.

<vol+></vol+>	Increases the volume.
<vol-></vol->	Decreases the volume.

Using the freeze function

The projected image can be paused and audio turned off regardless of the playback of the external device.



1) Press the <FREEZE> button.

- The image freezes and audio disappears.
- 2) Press the <FREEZE> button again.
 - Freezing of the image is canceled and audio reappears.

Note

• [FREEZE] is displayed on the screen when video is paused.

Using the on-screen display function

Turn off the on-screen display function (no display) when you do not wish the viewers to see the on-screen display, such as the menu or the input terminal name.



- 1) Press the <ON SCREEN> button.
 - The on-screen display disappears.
- 2) Press the <ON SCREEN> button again.
 - The on-screen display appears.

Note

 If you press the <MENU> button on the control panel for at least three seconds while the on-screen display is off (hidden), the on-screen display is turned on.

Using the presentation timer function

The presentation timer function can be operated.

Presentations, etc. can be performed while checking the elapsed time or time remaining in the preset time.



1) Press the <P-TIMER> button.

- The count is started.
- The elapsed time or the remaining time is displayed at the bottom right of the projected image.

2) Press the <P-TIMER> button again.

• The count is stopped.

3) Press the <P-TIMER> button again.

• The count is resumed.

Note

- The presentation timer is ended by holding the <P-TIMER> button down for at least three seconds.
- For details such as presentation timer function settings, refer to [DISPLAY OPTION] menu → [P-TIMER] (→ page 85).

Using the automatic setup function

The automatic setup function can be used to automatically adjust the resolution, clock phase, and image position when analog RGB signals consisting of bitmap images such as computer signals are being input, or to automatically adjust the image position when DVI-D/HDMI signals are input. Supplying images with bright white borders at the edges and high-contrast black and white characters is recommended when the system is in automatic adjustment mode. Avoid supplying images that include halftones or gradation, such as photographs and computer graphics.



1) Press the <AUTO SETUP> button.

[COMPLETE] is displayed when it has completed without any problem.

Note

- The clock phase may shift even if it has completed without any incident. In such cases, adjust the [POSITION] menu → [CLOCK PHASE]
 (⇒ page 72).
- If an image with blurred edges or a dark image is input, [INCOMPLETE] may appear or adjustment may not be performed properly even when [COMPLETE] appears. In this case, adjust the settings in the [ADVANCED MENU] menu → [INPUT RESOLUTION] (→ page 75), [POSITION] → [CLOCK PHASE] (→ page 72), and [SHIFT] (→ page 70).
- Adjust special signals according to the [DISPLAY OPTION] menu \rightarrow [AUTO SETUP] (\Rightarrow page 78).
- · Automatic adjustment may not work depending on the model of the computer
- Automatic adjustment may not work for a synchronization signal of C-SY or SYNC ON GREEN.
- Images may be disrupted for a few seconds during automatic adjustment, but it is not a malfunction.
- · Adjustment is required for each input signal.
- Automatic adjustment can be canceled by pressing the <MENU> button during the automatic adjustment operation.
- If the automatic setup function is used while moving images are being input, the adjustment may not be performed properly even for an RGB signal that can use automatic setup. [INCOMPLETE] may appear, or adjustment may not be finished properly even if [COMPLETE] appears.

Using the keystone distortion correction function

The [KEYSTONE] menu can be displayed.

You can correct the keystone distortion that occurs when the projector is installed tilted or when the screen is tilted.



1) Press the <KEYSTONE> button.

• The individual adjustment screen of [KEYSTONE] or [CORNER CORRECTION] ([UPPER LEFT]) is displayed.

2) Press the <KEYSTONE> button again.

The other individual adjustment screen is displayed.
 When the [KEYSTONE] individual adjustment screen is displayed in Step 1), the [CORNER CORRECTION] individual adjustment screen ([UPPER LEFT]) is displayed.

Note

- After the individual adjustment screen of [KEYSTONE] or [CORNER CORRECTION] is displayed, press ▲▼◀▶ to adjust the keystone distortion.
- Either setting of [KEYSTONE] or [CORNER CORRECTION] is enabled. If the other item is adjusted after [KEYSTONE] or [CORNER CORRECTION] was adjusted, the previous setting value will be reset.
- If the <ENTER> button is pressed while the [CORNER CORRECTION] individual adjustment screen is displayed, the individual adjustment screen for the next corner is displayed.
- Refer to the [POSITION] menu \rightarrow [KEYSTONE] (\Rightarrow page 72) for details.

Using the digital zoom function

The [DIGITAL ZOOM] menu can be displayed. You can enlarge images.

D.ZOOM 5 button

- Press the <D.ZOOM> button.
 The [DIGITAL ZOOM] screen is displayed.
- 2) Press **♦** to adjust the magnification.
- 3) Press the <ENTER> button.
- 4) Press $\blacktriangle \lor \blacklozenge \lor \blacklozenge$ to move the zoom position.

Note

Refer to the [DISPLAY OPTION] menu → [DIGITAL ZOOM] (⇒ page 86) for details.

Switching the aspect ratio of the image

You can switch aspect ratios according to the input signal.



1) Press the <ASPECT> button.

• The setting will change each time you press the button.

Refer to the [POSITION] menu → [ASPECT] (→ page 70) for details.

Using the P IN P function

Locate a separate, small sub screen in the main screen to project two images simultaneously.

Using the function button





 Can only be used when a signal is input from the <RGB 1 IN> terminal, <RGB 2 IN> terminal, <DVI-D IN> terminal, <HDMI IN> terminal, <DIGITAL LINK/LAN> terminal, and <DisplayPort IN> terminal.
- When [WIDE] is set, the image may appear distorted because a signal is determined to be the same signal even if a synchronizing frequency changes slightly.
- When a signal to be input corresponds to multiple signals set in [WIDE], a registered signal with a high memory number receives priority.
 Example: a signal to be input that corresponds to memory numbers A2, A4, and B1 will be determined to be B1.
- When a registration signal is deleted, the settings are also deleted.
- In an environment where multiple types of signals are input to the same terminal, signals are sometimes not determined correctly when the setting is set to [WIDE].

Sub memory

The projector has a sub memory function that can register the multiple image adjustment data, even if it is recognized as the same signal by the frequency or format of the synchronization signal source.

Use this function when you need to adjust the picture quality such as switching of the aspect ratio or white balance by the same synchronization signal source. The sub memory includes all the data that can be adjusted for each signal, such as the screen aspect ratio and data adjusted in the [PICTURE] item ([CONTRAST], [BRIGHTNESS], etc.).

Registering to the sub memory

1) Press ▲▼ on the normal screen (when the menu is not displayed).

- The sub memory registration screen is displayed if the sub memory is not registered. Proceed to Step 3).
- A list of sub memories registered to the signal currently input is displayed.
- By selecting [SUB MEMORY] in the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu → [FUNCTION BUTTON], the <FUNCTION> button on the remote control can be used instead of **↓**.

2) Press ▲▼◀▶ to select the sub memory number to register in [SUB MEMORY LIST].

3) Press the <ENTER> button.

• The [SIGNAL NAME CHANGE] screen is displayed.





- The maximum transmission distance between the twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector is 100 m (328'1"). If this distance is exceeded, image and sound may be disrupted and may cause a malfunction in LAN communication.
- When laying cables between a twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector, check that cable characteristics are compatible with CAT5e or higher using tools such as a cable tester or cable analyzer.
- When using a relay connector midway, include it in the measurement.
- Do not use a hub between a twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector.
- Do not pull cables forcefully. Also, do not bend or fold cables unnecessarily.
- To reduce the effects of noise as much as possible, stretch out the cables between the twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector without any loops.
- Lay the cables between a twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector away from other cables, particularly power cables.
- When installing multiple cables, run them side by side along the shortest distance possible without bundling them together.
- After laying the cables, confirm that the value of [SIGNAL QUALITY] in the [NETWORK] menu → [DIGITAL LINK STATUS] is displayed in green (indicates normal quality). (→ page 110)
- For twisted-pair-cable transmitter of other manufacturers of which the operation has been verified with the DIGITAL LINK compatible projector, refer to Panasonic website (http://panasonic.net/avc/projector/). Note that the verification for devices of other manufacturers has been made for the items set by Panasonic Corporation, and not all the operations have been verified. For operation or performance problems caused by the devices of other manufacturers, contact the respective manufacturers.

This chapter describes methods of inspection when there are problems, maintenance, and replacement of the units.


Lamp/temperature/filter indicators

When an indicator lights up

If a problem should occur inside the projector, the lamp indicator <LAMP>, the temperature indicator <TEMP>, and the filter indicator <FILTER> will inform you by lighting or flashing. Check the status of the indicators and remedy the indicated problems as follows.

Attention

• When switching off the projector to deal with problems, make sure to follow the procedure in "Switching off the projector" (> page 49).

- When switching off the projector, make sure to follow the procedures in "Switching off the projector" (
 page 49).

Maintenance

Outer case

Wipe off dirt and dust with a soft, dry cloth.

- If the dirt is persistent, soak the cloth with water and wring it thoroughly before wiping. Dry off the projector with a dry cloth.
- Do not use benzene, thinner, or rubbing alcohol, other solvents, or household cleaners. Doing so may deteriorate the outer case.
- When using chemically treated dust cloths, follow the instructions written on its packaging.

Lens front surface

Wipe off dirt and dust from the front surface of the lens with a soft clean cloth.

- Do not use a cloth that is fluffy, dusty, or soaked with oil/water.
- Since the lens is fragile, do not use excessive force when wiping the lens.

Attention

The lens is made of glass. Impacts or excessive force when wiping may scratch its surface. Handle with care.

Air filter unit


Perform maintenance of the air filter in the following case.

• The air filter is clogged with dust, causing the filter replacement message to appear on the screen and the filter indicator <FILTER> to light in red.

Attention

- Make sure to turn off the power before performing maintenance on the air filter unit.
- Make sure that the projector is stable, and perform the maintenance in a safe place where the unit will not be damaged even if you drop the air filter unit.

Removing the air filter unit



1) Remove the air filter cover. (Fig. 1)


- Use a Phillips screwdriver to turn the air filter cover fixing screw (x1) counterclockwise until it turns freely, and gently pull open in the direction of the arrow with your finger placed on the indent of the air filter cover and remove the cover.
- When pulling open the air filter cover, be sure to firmly hold the air filter cover with your hand. Opening the air filter cover quickly may result in the cover falling.

2) Remove the air filter unit.

- Pull out the air filter unit from the tabs of the projector while slightly pressing the tab at the center of the frame at the connecting terminal side (rear side) inward as shown by the arrow, and remove the air filter unit. (Fig. 2)
- After pulling out the air filter unit, remove foreign objects and dust from the air filter unit compartment and the projector's air intake port if there are any. (Fig. 3)

Cleaning the air filter unit

Remove the air filter unit beforehand according to the previously described procedure in "Removing the air filter unit".



1) Wash the air filter unit. (Fig. 1)

- i) Soak the air filter unit in cold or warm water and then lightly rinse it.
 - Do not use cleaning tools such as brushes.
 - When rinsing, hold the frame of the air filter unit without putting strong pressure on the filter.
- ii) Rinse the air filter unit two to three times using fresh water each time.
 - Insufficient rinsing may result in odors.

2) Dry the air filter unit. (Fig. 2)

- . Let the air filter unit naturally dry off in a well-ventilated place where there is little dust and is not exposed to direct sunlight.
- Do not dry using drying devices such as dryers.
- After the air filter unit is dried, proceed to "Attaching the air filter unit" (
 page 132).

Attaching the air filter unit

1) Attach the air filter unit to the projector.

- Perform Step 2) in "Removing the air filter unit" in the reverse order.
- Push in the air filter unit securely until it clicks into place.

2) Attach the air filter cover.

- Perform Step 1) in "Removing the air filter unit" in the reverse order to close the air filter cover, and push in the air filter cover securely until it clicks into place.
- Use a Phillips screwdriver to firmly tighten the air filter cover fixing screw (x1).

Attention

- After washing the air filter unit, dry it thoroughly before attaching it back to the projector. Attaching a wet unit will cause an electric shock or malfunction.
- Do not disassemble the air filter unit.
- Make sure that the air filter unit is properly attached before using the projector. If it is not attached, the projector will suck in dirt and dust
 causing a malfunction.

Note

- If you use the projector without attaching the air filter unit, the filter indicator <FILTER> flashes in red and the message appears on the projected image for approximately 30 seconds.
- Replace the air filter unit with the new optional Replacement Filter Unit (Model No.: ET-RFE300) if it is damaged or if the dirt does not come
 off even after washing.
- Air filter replacement is recommended after cleaning the unit two times.
- The dust-proof properties may be reduced after each cleaning.

Replacing the unit

Lamp unit

The lamp unit is a consumable component. Refer to "When to replace the lamp unit" (
 page 133) for details about the replacement cycle. When purchasing the optional Replacement Lamp Unit (Model No.: ET-LAE300), consult your dealer. It is recommended that you request a qualified technician to replace the lamp unit. Consult your dealer.

Warning

Replace the lamp unit after the lamp has cooled (after waiting at least one hour). The high temperature inside the cover will cause burns.

Notes on the replacement of the lamp unit

- A Phillips screwdriver is necessary when replacing the lamp unit.
- Since the luminous lamp is made of glass, it may burst if dropped or hit with a hard object. Handle with care.
- Do not disassemble or modify the lamp unit.
- When replacing the lamp unit, be sure to hold it by the handle because its surface is pointed and its shape is protruded.
- The lamp may rapture. Replace the lamp unit carefully so the glass fragments of the lamp do not scatter. While attaching the projector to the ceiling, do not work right under the lamp unit or do not conduct work while your face is near the lamp unit.
- The lamp contains mercury. When disposing of used lamp units, contact your local authorities or dealer for correct methods of disposal.

Attention

• Panasonic takes no responsibility for any damage or malfunction of the product resulting from use of lamp units which are not manufactured by Panasonic. Use only specified lamp units.

Note

• The model numbers of accessories and optional accessories are subject to change without prior notice.

When to replace the lamp unit

The lamp unit is a consumable component. Since its brightness gradually decreases over time, it is necessary to replace the lamp unit regularly. The estimated duration before replacement is 3 000 hours, but the lamp may go off before reaching to 3 000 hours, depending on the characteristics of the individual lamp, usage conditions, and the installation environment. It is recommended that the Replacement Lamp Unit be prepared earlier.

If you continue to use the lamp unit after 3 000 hours has elapsed, the lamp turns off automatically after approximately 10 minutes, as it may cause malfunction of the projector.



How to replace the lamp unit

Attention

- While attaching the projector to the ceiling, do not work right under the lamp unit or do not conduct work while your face is near the lamp unit.
- Do not remove or loosen the screws other than specified ones when replacing the lamp unit.
- Make sure to attach the lamp unit and the lamp cover securely.

• If the lamp unit is not installed properly, remove it and then push it in slowly. Pushing it in quickly or forcibly may break the connector.



Set the <MAIN POWER> switch to <OFF> and disconnect the power plug from the power outlet.
 Wait at least one hour and check if the lamp unit has cooled down.

2) Remove the lamp cover. (Fig. 1)

- Use a Phillips screwdriver to turn the lamp cover fixing screw (x1) counterclockwise until it turns freely, and slide the lamp cover slowly in the direction of the arrow to remove it.
- Opening the lamp cover quickly may result in falling.

3) Remove the lamp unit. (Fig. 2)

- Use a Phillips screwdriver to turn the lamp unit fixing screws (x3) counterclockwise until they turn freely, and remove the lamp unit.
- · Hold the handles of the lamp unit and remove it straight.

4) Push in the new lamp unit while paying attention to the insertion position.

- If the lamp unit is not installed properly, remove it and then push it in slowly. Pushing it in quickly or forcibly may break the connector.
- 5) Use a Phillips screwdriver to firmly tighten the lamp unit fixing screws (x3).
 - Make sure to attach the lamp unit securely.

6) Attach the lamp cover.

- i) Perform Step 2) in the reverse order to attach the lamp cover.
- ii) Use a Phillips screwdriver to firmly tighten the lamp cover fixing screw (x1).Make sure to attach the lamp cover slowly and securely.

Note

. When you replace the lamp unit with new one, the projector resets the runtime of the lamp unit automatically.

Air filter unit

When the dust remains after cleaning, the filter replacement timing has come. The Replacement Filter Unit (Model No.: ET-RFE300) is an optional accessory. To purchase the product, consult your dealer.

How to replace the air filter unit

Attention

- Make sure to turn off the power before replacing the air filter unit.
- Make sure that the projector is stable, and perform the replacement in a safe place where the unit will not be damaged even if you drop the air filter unit.

1) Remove the air filter unit.

• Refer to "Removing the air filter unit" (+ page 131).

2) Attach the optional Replacement Filter Unit (Model No.: ET-RFE300) to the projector.

• Refer to "Attaching the air filter unit" (> page 132).

Attention

• When using the projector, be sure to attach the air filter unit. If it is not attached, the projector will suck in dirt and dust causing a malfunction.
